#### Municipal Clerk Early Beginnings!

A city clerk is one of the oldest public service positions, dating back to Ancient Greece. In the United States, the office of city clerk was one of the first to be established when early colonists set up local governments. Today, a city clerk is an elected or appointed senior official responsible for many administrative functions relating to maintaining a municipality's public records. Although the power and responsibility of a city clerk vary by location, the office of the city clerk typically serves the mayor, the city manager, the city council, and all other administrative departments of the city government. Depending on the structure of a city's government, the position may include the roles of public relations, office manager, purchasing agent, and customer service representative. (con'f on Page 2)

In addition, many cities with small staff require the office of the city clerk to assume responsibilities previously performed by other city departments. This may include issuing zoning permits, vehicle stickers, and other

types of licenses; maintaining a record of planning commission actions and the Elections Office.

A typical day in the life of a city clerk might include some or all of these activities:

- Preparing agendas and recording proceedings;
- Certifying and recording resolutions, regulations, and ordinances passed by the council;
- Overseeing city elections and administering oaths of office; and maintaining custody of the city seal.

In 1924, Belle Isle was incorporated as a town.

By ballot vote of more than two-thirds of those present, the name "Belle Isle" was chosen. The name means "Beautiful Island." Mr. C.H. Hoffner was elected the first Mayor.

In 2024, one hundred years later, the City is preparing to celebrate a milestone anniversary with fanfare and a focus on community. Helping to coordinate the 100th anniversary of attaining city status is The Mayor, Council, Staff and the Special Events Committee, and You.

The centennial celebration will provide a way to acknowledge the central role that the City has played in creating a community that offers the continuation and preservation of its natural resources and beautiful oak trees-as an introduction to a beautiful life setting - Celebrating 100 years of community.

At the Clerk's Office, we would like to kick start the upcoming celebration by establishing a time capsule. ## NOISE CONTROL ORDINANCES

CH 10, ART III, SEC 10-61 THROUGH 10-69

### Do you know the NEW FL S.S. 316.293(2) on Vehicle Noise:

(a) No person shall modify the exhaust system of a motor vehicle or any other noise-abatement device of a motor vehicle operated or to be operated upon the highways of this state in such a manner that the noise emitted by the motor vehicle is above that emitted by the vehicle as originally manufactured.

## Are you tired of the noise coming from the lake?

The Belle Isle Police
Department is committed to
enforcing the new noise
ordinance, but we need your
help! If you are tired of the
noise coming from the lake,
talk to your neighbors and
help put a stop to the loud,
vulgar music coming from
the lake.

## **See Something Say Something**

Police officers cannot be the victim of a noise complaint!
However, per Belle Isle City
Ordinance, "When two or more persons residing in separate residences...are in general agreement as to the times, durations, and disturbing nature of the noise, such testimony will constitute prima facie evidence of a noise disturbance."

#### Shared Evidence

Residents must be willing to make a statement for officers to be able to take any law enforcement action. With two or more complainants, the officer can only ask the violator to turn the music down—
SS 162.21(3)(b).

Call the Belle Isle Police Department non-emergency number at 407.836.4357. Tell the operator you are a Belle Isle resident, you need an officer dispatched, and you want to meet with the officer!

#### **False Alarm Program**

Provide a layer of security and peace of mind

## If you have an alarm system in the City of Belle Isle, you MUST register it.


The City Council of the City of Belle Isle passed Ordinance 18-14 amending Chapter 15-75, which provides for the installation, maintenance, and operation of security alarms and regulations designed to inhibit the occurrence and reoccurrence of false alarms.

The City of Belle Isle requires residents to obtain an alarm installation permit to install security alarms. When functioning correctly, home security alarms provide homeowners a layer of security and peace of mind. Please review these suggestions to avoid false alarms at your home or business:

- Ensure you have obtained a City of Belle Isle Alarm Installation Permit
- Request your alarm company to inspect your system annually and regularly check the batteries on your system, particularly after power outages.
- Routinely check contacts on your doors and windows to ensure they are in good condition and adequately adhered to the surface.
- Ensure there is a sufficient pet path to avoid activation when your pet walks around your home.
- Everyone with access to the system must know the proper Code and how to arm and disarm the system.

If the alarm is set off accidentally, immediately contact the alarm company and be available until they have contacted you so you can alert them the activation is accidental. More information can be found in Chapter 15-75 (b) of the City Code at <a href="www.belleislefl.gov">www.belleislefl.gov</a>. Please review the entire Code to ensure you comply. ■

The codification – or organization – of ordinances is essential to the governmental function. It provides local governments and citizens with a body of current, enforceable laws that makes the code easy to use and reference.

Abiding by the City's Code of Ordinances helps all of us to be good neighbors and encourages pride in neighborhoods and the City. The codes are in place to establish and maintain standards for the community's health, safety, and aesthetics. City staff periodically reviews the ordinances to ensure the regulations are functioning effectively. If improvements can be made to the existing rules, amendments are proposed by City staff for consideration by the Mayor and City Council. Once the Council approves the modifications or new regulations, these ordinances become law and are enforced by staff.


#### DID YOU KNOW?

What is the difference between an Ordinance and a Resolution?

A resolution generally states a position or policy of a city.

An ordinance is more formal and authoritative than a resolution. An ordinance is a local law that usually regulates persons or property and usually relates to a matter of a general and permanent nature

If your project value exceeds \$2,500, you will need to file a Notice of Commencement (NOC) with the Orange County Comptroller's Office before issuing the permit.

- Payment is due upon receipt and is acceptable through checks made payable to the "City of Belle Isle" or credit card.
- Different permits need inspections at various points in the project. It will expire if your permit is open for six months without an inspection. For next-day inspections, please send your request by 3:00 p.m.
- Once you complete and pass your inspections, the permit will be final. If you don't close out your permit, this could cause issues later when trying to sell your property.

## IS YOUR CONTRACTOR ON THE LEVEL?

While they might look the same, THERE ARE CRITICAL DIFFERENCES BETWEEN A LICENSED CONTRACTOR AND A FRAUDULENT OR UNLICENSED ONE. Recognizing these differences can save you significant stress, time, money, and legal hassle.

Recently, unregistered tree companies have been coming into the City and contracting property owners for work, especially on weekends when they know City Hall is closed. All tree companies have to be registered with the City. Unregistered companies may not have insurance and may charge you for extra work that you didn't ask for. If you use an unregistered tree company, you may be subject to a fine; not the tree company. Before using a tree service, we ask that you contact City Hall, and the City staff will tell you if that company is registered. Under the Belle Isle Municipal Code, Section 48-63 (d)(4): <u>Use of unregistered tree removal service and landscape architect</u> prohibited. No commercial tree removal service shall be used by the owner or occupant of the property unless the service has first registered with the City. In addition, all Contractors shall remove all debris (yard or building) from the residence. JJ's Waste and Recycling nor the City are responsible for removing debris. A violation of this subsection (d)(4) may be brought before the city code enforcement magistrate according to section 14-31 et al., as an irreversible violation subject to the imposition of a fine not to





exceed \$5,000.00 per violation.

A REQUEST IS MADE FOR FUNDS **UP FRONT. Payments should** only be for portions of work or services already provided.



YOU ARE ASKED TO OBTAIN THE PERMITS YOURSELF. If an owner obtains their own permits, the owner is responsible for the entire permitting process—including acquiring a certificate of occupancy or notice of commencement, if required.



BUSINESS CARD DOES NOT DISPLAY A LICENSE NUMBER. Licensed contractors are required by law to include their license number in all advertising.



THE CONTRACTOR IS NOT WILLING TO PUT ALL TERMS IN WRITING AND OFFERS ONLY A VERBAL CONTRACT. It is paramount to have a written contract signed by both parties that includes the contractor's license number and description of



THE CONTRACTOR INFORMS YOU THE PROJECT DOES NOT REQUIRE A PERMIT. Make a quick call to Belle Isle City Hall at 407-851-7730 or Universal Services Building Inspections at 407-581-8161 to verify the scope of the job.



THE CONTRACTOR PROVIDED A LICENSE BUT YOU'RE NOT SURE IT'S VALID. An Occupational license or Tax certificate does NOT qualify an individual to act as a contractor.





#### Red, White, and Blue No Bake Ice Box Cake

(By Admin Assistant, Heidi Peacock)

19 oz graham crackers 8 oz cream cheese, softened 2 (3.4 oz) packages Vanilla Instant Pudding 2-1/2 cups cold milk 12 oz Cool whip (or homemade whipped cream) 3 cups fresh strawberries, sliced 1-1/2 cups fresh blueberries 2 oz white chocolate chips

- Beat cream cheese and dry pudding mixes in large bowl with mixer until blended.
- Gradually beat in milk.
- **Gently stir in Cool Whip** or homemade whipped cream, reserving ½ cup.
- Spread a thin layer of cool whip in a 9x13 pan just to coat the bottom.
- Layer 5 graham crackers across the center of the pan, then 2 more, breaking them as needed to fit around the top and bottom edges.
- Spread a layer of pudding mixture over grahams and top with a layer of blueberries and sliced strawberries.
- Place graham crackers on top of berries, then pudding mixture, then layer of berries again.
- Repeat the grahampudding-berries layers 1 more time (3 times total) and you should reach the top of the pan.
- Refrigerate for at least 4 hours or overnight until the graham crackers have softened completely.
- When ready to serve, melt white chocolate chips in a bowl as directed on package and drizzle over dessert.

Preserving and enhancing buffers and berms & swales are great stewardship practices to protect your lake, even when not required for the original development.

# Best Management Practices CONSERVATION EASEMENTS, BUFFERS AND BERMS & SWALES


Often installed by the developer as a condition of their building permit, homeowners may be required to maintain a conservation easement, buffer or berm & swale just upland from the normal high water line. These areas are designed to mitigate the impacts of the homes within a subdivision on a lake or wetland, and protect the near-shore ecosystem. You may be restricted from or be required to obtain permits for any activity within these areas. You can contact EPD at 407-836-1400 to find out what is and isn't permitted. Many times, this information gets lost in the shuffle when buying a home, so it is important that homeowners are proactive in determining if their property has a conservation easement, buffer or required berm & swale. This information should be on the property plat and is also available through the Orange County Property Appraiser, www.ocpafl.org.

#### What are Buffers and Conservation Easements?

Buffers and conservation easements are restricted places on a piece of property designed to protect the adjacent natural resource, such as your lake. These areas are intended to be left natural to provide a buffer between the development and the surrounding ecosystem. Buffers and conservation easements may exist between your yard and a lake, stream or wetland.

#### What is a Berm & Swale?

A berm and swale is a low hill and associated depression incorporated into the landscape, typically parallel to the shoreline. This area slows and captures runoff and allows water and pollutants to percolate into the ground. This prevents pollutants and excess nutrients from entering the lake from your yard. Homeowners should maintain their berm and swale. Swales should not be filled in or planted with trees, shrubs or other woody plants. Plants and fill material will prevent the swale from functioning as designed.



Shoreline vegetation helps absorb chemicals and nutrients before they can add to the nutrient loading in the lake.

# Best Management Practices

#### OTHER THINGS TO CONSIDER

#### Pools & Spas

Orange County prohibits the discharge of pool and spa water into storm drains and the stormwater system. Pool chemicals like chlorine can be toxic to fish and other aquatic life. To properly drain your pool or backwash your filter system, do the following:

- Use a test kit to check that chlorine level is 0.01mg/L or less. If chlorine level is not ZERO, wait at least 48 hours and test again.
- Check to ensure water is clear and free of debris and algae.
- 3. Test to be sure pH of discharge water is between 6.5 and 8.0.
- 4. KEEP DISCHARGE WATER ON YOUR PROPERTY by pumping slowly onto your yard. Keep discharges out of neighbors' yards and streets.
- Rinse filters over yards and **NOT** over driveways or paved areas.
- 6. Dispose of all filter media such as diatomaceous earth in the trash.



A Code Violation can lead to a fine.

#### Saltwater Pools

High concentrations of salt can kill vegetation. A pump truck may be needed to draw down large amounts of water. Small amounts can likely be diluted and be put on a lawn without killing plants, but never directed to the street or into ditches, stormwater ponds or storm drains.

#### Aquariums

Local municipalities and the State of Florida spend billions of dollars each year trying to control exotic and invasive plant and animal species. Once released into the wild, these species can spread disease, outcompete native species, and decimate populations of native plants and animals. They may seem harmless but introduced exotic plants and animals can change entire ecosystems and lead to the loss of native species and habitats.

Many fertilizers contain nitrogen and phosphorus, also known as *nutrients*. Pollution from nutrients harms our natural waterbodies – springs, lakes and rivers – by causing algae blooms and poor water quality.

June 1-Sept 30
Apply only fertilizer with zero nitrogen and zero phosphorus

Oct 1—May 31
Fertilizer containing
nitrogen is permitted.
However, it must contain
at least 65% slow
release nitrogen.

Always do the following: (1) Keep fertilizer at least 25 ft from natural water bodies, (2) Limit each application to 1 pound total nitrogen per 1,000 sqft (max 3 pounds per year); and (3) Use zero phosphorus unless a soil test shows a deficiency.
